# Taming the Tongue: Four Principles To Use Our Words Wisely

It is no secret that our mouths frequently get us in a lot of trouble. It may be harsh words spoken in anger, letting profanity flow from your lips, telling a parent to "shut up" as a child, or not speaking up when there has been an injustice against someone. It is no wonder that scripture says in James 3:6 that the tongue has the spark to set one's whole life on fire!

It doesn't have to be this way. As Provers 12:18 says, "The tongue of the wise brings healing." Consider the following four principles that can help us be wise with the use of our words.

**Don't speak** is the first principle to be wise with our words. That's right, sometimes the best use of our words is to just shut up and not use any words. Proverbs 17:28 says that "even fools are thought wise if they keep silent," and Proverbs 10:19 says, "the prudent hold their tongues." Sure, silence can be awkward, but plenty of unhelpful words have been spoken by people who didn't know what to say and insisted on speaking anyway.

The second principle is this, **think before you speak**. Consider these verses, Proverbs 29:20, "*Do you see someone who speaks in haste? There is more hope for a fool tan for them*," and James 1:19, "*be quick to listen, slow to speak...*" We've all had those moments when we say something, then immediately regret what we just said. Most times, if we simply pause a few moments to collect our thoughts before speaking, it will go better for us.

Third, when you do speak, **don't say too much**. The author of Ecclesiastes says this in 5:2, "*let your words be few*," and in 10:14 he writes, "*fools multiply words*." I'll admit, as a preacher, I've been guilty of a few "long-winded sermons." Hopefully they are few and far between. Several years ago, I had someone say to me (probably after a long sermon), "It is okay to make a point and let it set. God can do the rest." So, say what needs to be said, and leave out all the rest.

Finally, **speak only helpful words**. This one is probably the most complicated because there are a lot of useful words that are hard words. Here are several verses that give insight into the words we do need to speak: Proverbs 15:7, "*lips of the wise spread knowledge*," Proverbs 31:8-9, "*Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves…speak up…defend the rights of the poor and needy*," Proverbs 28:23, "whoever **rebukes** a person will in the end gain favor," and Ephesians 4:29 says, speak, "only what is **helpful** for building others up…."
