A New Beginning

"As we begin a new year, we typically make resolutions and set goals to accomplish during the coming 12 months. They tell us that goal setting is important for us and helps us maintain forward mobility in our lives. No one ever improves while sitting still. Christians should set spiritual goals for themselves in order to continue the journey of spiritual maturity which is, by the way, a journey of a lifetime. Here are a few suggestions for our spiritual goals:

• Daily Prayer and Bible Reading: Pray without ceasing... (1 Thessalonians 5:17); Till I come, give attention to reading, to exhortation, to doctrine. (1 Timothy 4:13)

• Continue to Develop the Fruits of the Spirit: But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control. Against such there is no law. (Galatians 5:22–23)

• Increase My Love, Benevolence and Care for Others: But do not forget to do good and to share, for with such sacrifices God is well pleased. (Hebrews 13:16)

• Improve My Attendance & Time Spent with the Church: And they continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in prayers. (Acts 2:42)

• Increase My Involvement in Evangelism: How then shall they call on Him in whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard? (Romans 10:14)"

Not Perfect, Just an Elder

"*Must be blameless*." Wow, count me out. I also happen to know exactly ZERO people who are blameless. Yet, that is one of the characteristics the apostle Paul says elders who shepherd churches should have.

As the early church grew, a leadership structure was needed to direct the affairs of churches as they lived out their faith. One example is found in Acts 6 when seven men were chosen as deacons for the ministry of daily food distribution. Later, as new churches began across the nations, Paul told Timothy and Titus, *"to appoint elders in every congregation,"* (Titus 1:5) to shepherd the churches.

Most of the qualities of elders given in scripture involve character, not knowledge or skill. Knowledge and skill are much easier to obtain that good character. A person's lifestyle and relationships provide the window to that person's character. One may say all the right words, but a person's true character is revealed by the fruit of one's life. It is vital for churches to have leaders who live out God's word and be examples for others to follow.

Being an elder is not an easy responsibility nor is it one of thanks, but it is one of utmost importance in leading the church. Consider Paul's comment in Titus 1:7, "...an elder is entrusted with God's work...." That put together with being "blameless" is probably enough to scare away just about anyone.

Let me offer a small insight. There is a big difference between being "blameless," and being, "perfect." No human can ever achieve being perfect, hence the need for our savior, Jesus Christ. However, one of the marks of a blameless person, is the one who can acknowledge a mistake and makes amends. To do so, requires one to be self-controlled, respectable, and not conceited. Those all happen to also be marks of an elder given by Paul.

You may never be called to be an elder, but the marks of an elder are characteristics that every follower of God should strive for. *"May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit,"* Romans 15:13.
